Serving schools in lockdown....again!

Despite the current lockdown and the many difficulties faced so far this year, we are grateful to have been able to continue serving schools in various ways. These two pages contain some insights into how we are continuing to support schools and young people.

Remote Pupil Support

Last term, our Chaplains were able to provide face-to-face support to pupils. This term, with the schools being closed for most young people, we have had the privilege of supporting pupils 'remotely'. This is done in agreement with the schools, parents, and pupils. Support has been conducted via email or phone calls, in line with safeguarding protocols. It is good to be able to continue to support pupils who are struggling at this time and there have also been opportunities to provide support and a listening ear to parents too! 'Rooted'

Last term, Sue and I led a small group called Rooted with some girls from Years 10 and 11 in a local school. This course covered issues such as identity, emotions,

friendship, self-esteem, being healthy and being brave. It included some creative activities, such as self-portraits, Christmas craft, dancing, 'jars of joy' and friendship bracelets. The girls were fairly shy at the beginning, but gradually grew in the last session, where the girls got involved in a prayer activities students can try! dance fitness workout, contributing their own dance moves and being willing to try new healthy snacks. We are hoping to run more small groups in the future, with other students.
